This chapter outlines the religious calendar for the nation which the priests were to lead the people in along with the required sacrifices and feasts that were to be observed. Note the emphasis in verse 4.

Leviticus 23:4 NASB 'These are the appointed times of the LORD, holy convocations which you shall proclaim at the times appointed for them.

Once the tabernacle was stationary and the temple was built, there were three times (Passover, Pentecost, and Day of Atonement/Booths) when a pilgrimage was required to be taken by all Jews to pray and offer sacrifices. There are indications that these times were not always celebrated nationally by their being called for by Hezekiah (2Ch 30) and Josiah (2Ki 23; 2Ch 35) of Judah after times of neglect. Ezra also reinstituted the national Passover celebration after the return from the exile and the rebuilding of the temple (Ezr 6). These holidays are still celebrated today by most Jews, although the pilgrimage to Jerusalem is not required since the temple was destroyed In AD 70, including Messianic Jews, who, along with Christians, believe that they all pointed to Jesus.

I've compiled a list of the various feasts in the Old Testament indicating how Jesus can be seen in them. This is not a definitive list but merely an overview. Much can be learned by further study of these special God appointed times and are well worth the time invested.

† Day of Atonement	Yom Kippur (Yome Ki- POOR)	10 Tishri (Sep-Oct)	Lev 23	10th day of Rosh HaShanah. The day the High Priest makes atonement for sin.	Jesus has entered the Holy of Holies as our High Priest who is ever making atonement for our sins.
† Feast of Booths or Tabernacles	Sukkot (Soo-KOTE)	15-22 Tishri (Sep-Oct)	Lev 23	Commemorates the 40 year wilderness journey. 8 days	Jesus is the Light of the world, our temporary home. (Possible time of Jesus' birth.)
Feast of Dedication	Hanukkah (KHA-noo- kah)	25 Kislev-2 Tevet (Nov or Dec)	John 10 (Maccabee s)	Purification of the Temple. 8 days. Not in Old Testament.	Reminder to remain faithful to Jesus in spite of persecution. Jesus is & will return victorious.
Feast of Lots	Purim (POOR-im)	14 or 15 Adar (Feb or Mar)	Esther	Preservation of Jewish People	God's faithful protection of the His people. Jesus delivers sinners from a decree of death.
